9: Basic First Aid Saturday 1st May 10:00am-4:00pm Bamber Bridge Methodist Church 295 Station Road, Bamber Bridge PR5 6ED



Steve Wardle is married with two boys. After serving thirteen years as a fireman in the Preston Fire Service Steve has spent the last four working as a volunteer and trainer for The Red Cross. He has trained people in all aspects of First Aid - his work taking him into schools, colleges, communities and businesses.

Basic First Aid is a vital tool in the Street Pastor's armoury, and this session is a basic non-certificated 'Save a Life' course. It deals with the fundamentals of CPR, basic life support, control of bleeding and recognising and treating various conditions like diabetes, stroke and heart attack. It also overviews general principles for dealing with sprains, strains and breaks.



It is a requirement for all volunteers that they complete this training programme; we require all volunteers to have completed the first 4 sessions before being allowed out onto the streets as these are considered foundational to the work. However, after that practical experience of working on the streets will help you to get the most out of the rest of the training.

We will be maintaining a training record for each volunteer, as well as asking for your feedback on each session to help us develop and improve what we are doing for you.

We are also aware that with the best will in the world, circumstances sometimes mean that you are unable to attend a training session. If this is the case, we ask you to let me know as early as possible. You will be responsible for getting a copy of the

notes from one of your colleagues for what you miss, and we also have some DVD's available of some of the sessions. We will also ask you to attend the sessions you miss the next time we run them, as we operate on an annual intake, and training basis.

Your acceptance onto the project is dependent upon your successful vetting clearance by the police, and your completion of the training. You will be asked for your uniform details at the start of the training, however, this remains the property of the Preston & South Ribble (North) Street Pastor project and will be issued to you once your vetting and initial training have been completed. Only then will we ask you for your volunteers payment.

10: Mentoring, Body Language and Listening Skills Monday 3rd May 6:00pm-10:00pm Fulwood Free Methodist Church, Lightfoot Lane, Fulwood. PR2 3LT

Roger Reid is the National Project Manager for the Ascension Trust, and is responsible for helping to initiate and support the growing number of Street Pastors projects springing up in cities, towns and villages across the UK.

Mentoring, Body Language & Listening Skills covers developing a listening attitude, understanding the concept of confidentiality, and useful exercises in listening and hearing, as well as exploring attending, active listening and body communication areas. This session will also stress how to recognise barriers to listening, the use of responding and empathy skills. The course is very interactive and encourages each person to participate in the activities





7: Knowing Your Community 3: Understanding Prostitution and Street Girls

Tim Keightley oversees the work of StreetLink, working amongst street girls in Preston, as well as being responsible for the day-to-day running of the Foxton Centre based in Avenham Preston. As a former Baptist Minister his faith significantly influences his professionalism.

Understanding Prostitution and Street Girls as the title of this session suggests, 'Understanding Prostitution & Street Girls' opens up the impact that such work has on these vulnerable girls in all areas, emotionally, physically, psychologically and spiritually. It provides a very clear, and sometimes shocking window into life from their perspective. Full of practical advice as to how to better help, understand and communicate to girls on the street whilst avoiding the tendency to condemn or stereo-type them.

8: Understanding Islam

Steve Bell has a B.Ed. (Hons.) degree from Nottingham University, an M.A in Applied Linguistics from the American University in Cairo and a Diploma in Missiology from All Nations College. A regular speaker at Spring Harvest, Keswick and New Wine, he is the author of 'Friendship First – the Manual' and most recently 'Grace for Muslims.' Steve's pedigree in cross-cultural mission is borne out of his service in Cairo between 1981 to 1990, where he taught English and developed relational witness with Muslim friends and new believers from Muslim backgrounds. From 1993 to 2002, he was Director of Action Partners Ministries before joining Interserve as Urban Vision team leader in 2006.



Understanding Islam covers a wide range of insights relevant to the Muslim faith, customs and way of life. It is an invaluable session in learning how to better understand and appreciate those of the Muslim faith.

Following a career in Psychiatric nursing Ian trained over three years at Moorlands College, Christchurch and commenced pastoral ministry at Nelson in August 2000 where he seeks to lead a relevant Bible based fellowship reaching out to the Pendle area, a bi-cultural mix of Islam and secular communities.



Roles & Responsibilities unpacks all the practical demands, qualities and responsibilities necessary to be a Street Pastor. The session looks at what it takes to do the task, attitude, awareness, patience and time, as well as incorporating helpful hints and tips for what to do when meeting a variety of characters whilst out on the streets.

2: Understanding Addiction and Drugs

'Addaction' began in 1967 with a letter published in the Guardian from a woman called Mollie Craven. Mollie's son was a heroin addict – an addiction that would eventually kill him. In a desperate search for support she started A.P.A. – Association for Parents of Addicts – which in the fullness of time would become 'Addaction' the largest drugs charity in the UK.

Trevor Landry currently works as a trainer and volunteer coordinator for the Addaction Lancashire Tower Programme. He possesses over a decade of experience working both in the UK & America within homelessness, mental health and substance misuse organizations. He has a broad background in project development, counselling and training.

Understanding Addiction & Drugs The drug awareness training day will guide your discovery of what drugs there are, the effects and criminal implications. It also discusses differing levels of substance use, defining what dependency is. It offers insights into what treatment options there are with an introduction to relapse prevention techniques. There is also mention of current harm reduction measures, how to respond to overdose and personal safety issues.

6: Knowing Your Community 2: Multi Agency Working & Policies

This is a multi agency evening, involving the police, Pr1me Focus and South Ribble Borough Council. Preston City Council's Neighbourhoods management schemes work with local residents counsellors and agencies to help improve services in the area. Pr1me Focus are responsible for the St Matthews and City Centre areas, and Annette Stevens is one of the Neighbourhood Managers responsible for this. DCI Lee Halstead meanwhile works within Preston CID, and how information and intelligence received is used to help make Preston safer. Sgt Julie Rawsthorne meanwhile works for the South Ribble police force and has an up to date knowledge of the issues facing the communities in the south of the city.

Multi-Agency Working and Policies breaks into 3 sections, taking the time to understand what issues face the communities in which we are working from the people working professionally in them; examining how the information we gather whilst on the streets can be used and shared; and what our policies and procedures are as a project.
